OPENING THOUGHT

Jesus' final prayer before the cross was for His followers to be one. Our culture thrives on division, but Jesus calls us to reflect His love and unity so that the world may believe in Him.

KEY POINTS

- · Jesus' final prayer shows His deep desire for unity.
- Unity gives credibility to the gospel; division weakens the witness.
- Unity doesn't mean uniformity—it means distinct people united in love.
- PRACTICAL STEPS: GUARD YOUR WORDS, RELATIONSHIPS, AND WITNESS.
- · Unity is a spiritual discipline that displays God's love to the world.

- 5. What practical step can you take this week to foster unity in your family, church, or online presence?
